Alberta Aids to Daily Living (AADL)



1 Are there income requirements for AADL?

There are no income requirements to be eligible for AADL. However, low-income families may apply for cost-share exemption if they meet the eligibility criteria. To access this exemption form, please click [here](#).

2 How can I find an AADL authorizer?

You must have a completed assessment from an AADL-authorized healthcare professional to access AADL services. You may find an AADL authorizer on our [Community Resource Database](#) using the keywords '[Medical Supplies and Equipment](#)'.

3 If my child is not toilet trained, when am I able to get diapers from AADL?

Individuals age four or older, experiencing moderate to severe incontinence, with an assessment by a specialist continence practitioner may access diaper supplies through AADL. For more information on benefits criteria regarding incontinence supplies, please click [here](#).

4 Where can I find a list of registered AADL vendors?

5 How does the cost share work?

AADL and clients share the cost of the program. Families pay 25% of the AADL maximum contribution to vendors providing supplies. The maximum cost is no more than \$500 per family per benefit year (July 1 to June 30).
